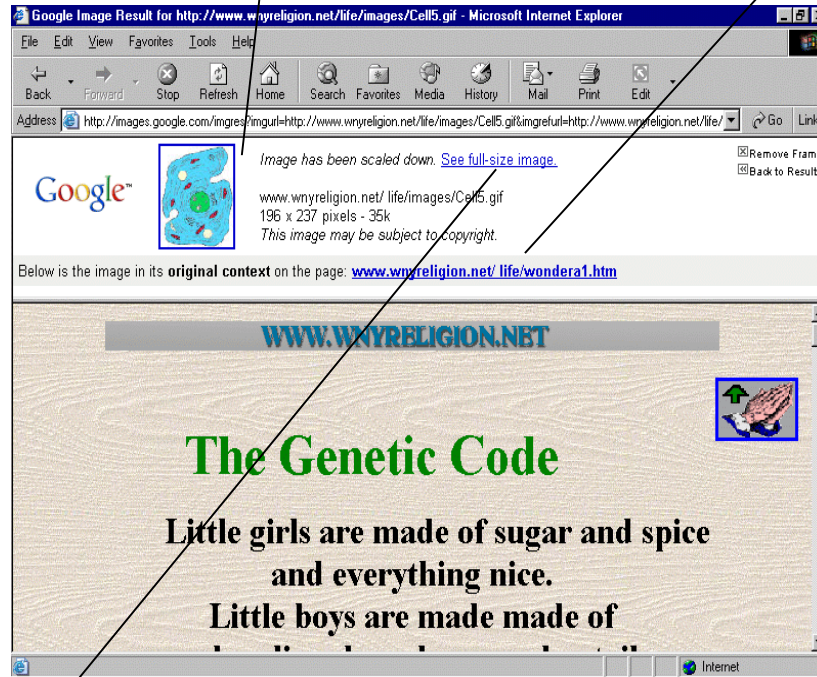


## Image Search

Assume for our purpose, we need an image of a cell.

1. Go back to [www.google.ca](http://www.google.ca)
2. Click on **Images**.
3. Type in **parts of a cell** and search.
4. Select one of the images by clicking on it and the result looks something like this:
5. This gives you: a scaled down image, the site from which the image is taken, and the text of the site from which it is taken.



If you wish to see a larger image, click on **See full size image**.

## Advanced Image Search

**Size** - the size of the image will determine what you can use it for. If you want an image that will print well or fill a PowerPoint slide, search for "large" images.

**Filetypes** - JPG files will work best for photographs. GIF files are OK for simple line art, but don't resize well. PNG is a relatively new format that may not work in all programs.

**Coloration** - lets you search only for black and white, line art or full color images.

**Domain** - limits the image search to a single site or domain.

## Copyright

Not everything you find on the Web can be used for free. In most cases, you do not have to ask permission of the copyright holder for a one-time use of an image. You should get permission before reproducing the file for use by others (eg., when creating a web page, for use in a project). A good rule to follow is when in doubt, don't use an image from the Internet. Use the graphics in your word processing program instead.
